YORhub 4 Good Fund

The YORhub fund is inviting community groups in the East Riding to submit applications for funding of up to £5,000 for their community projects. To qualify, projects must be sustainable, locally-sourced, use small to medium enterprises, and encourage self-sufficiency, empowerment and sustainability.

Jayne Nendick, project manager at Shores Homecare Patchwork Project in Withernsea, received backing from the fund in 2013 to buy a larger greenhouse. She said, "Thanks to the funding received we've tripled space available and taken the project to the next level by making it accessible and open to all."

Other recent projects include 'Men in Sheds' and Walton Community Library:

Walton Community Library: the funding was used to re-configure the Library's front desk, fit a new carpet to replace the stained and worn existing carpet, buy two new leather sofas, a coffee table and a hot drinks machine to create a small lounge area. The area is used by everyone in the Walton village community, such as young mothers, elderly visitors, and reading groups, as a meeting place and to provide a small, safe and welcoming environment for activities.

Men in Sheds: this programme of activities brings men from different backgrounds together to build their confidence and skills. This includes people who have experienced bereavement, redundancy, retirement or relationship breakdown. The YORbuild 4 Good Fund allowed the project to invest in tools and materials, and provided men over 55 with opportunities to learn new skills and make new friends and in doing so, to rebuild their confidence. So far, twenty-four men have visited the shed with nine attending more than once a week.

The pack includes guidance notes on completing and submitting the application. The Fund is only open to applications sponsored by users of the YORbuild and YORcivil construction frameworks — a list of sponsor organisations is included in the application pack.

The deadline for return of applications to the fund is Wednesday 30 April 2014.

Superfast Broadband Business Support

Businesses across the East Riding are set to benefit from investment from the European Regional Development Fund. This will help small- and medium-sized enterprises take advantage of new digital technologies enabled by faster broadband.

The Broadband East Riding project has developed a business support programme to help eligible businesses learn about, and exploit the opportunities presented by digital technologies.

The business support programme includes a dedicated business adviser providing one-to-one advice, a diagnostic report highlighting strengths, weaknesses and an action plan to take forward. They also run workshops and training courses on a range of topics.

The business support programme can only help businesses that are eligible, which is subject to ERDF criteria. For more information on what is available, and to register an interest, visit

Dog ban on beaches

Dogs will be banned from four East Riding beaches from I May to ensure children, families and visitors can play in the sand without stepping in something nasty. The ban by East Riding of Yorkshire Council will run until Tuesday, 30 September, the end of the holiday season.

The four areas are:

- Bridlington north beach, from the north pier to a line extending east from Limekiln Lane
- Bridlington south beach from the south pier to a line extending east from Kingston Road
- Hornsea Beach
- Withernsea Beach.

The ban is part of the council's campaign to win the coveted Blue Flag Awards run by Keep Britain Tidy to those deemed to be the best bathing beaches. Dog exclusions are among the standards that have to be met.

Dog owners are being urged to observe the bans and exercise their pets on areas outside the designated zones, which are clearly signposted. Anyone walking their dog in the restricted areas during the period of the ban could be issued with a £75 fixed penalty notice. Reaching Communities - Volunteen Project

East Riding Voluntary Action Services (ERVAS) has received £296,541 from Big Lottery's Reaching Communities programme to support the expansion of their Volunteen scheme, which supports our young people to increase their employability skills by engaging them in accessible and appropriate social action.

Volunteen will work with at least 15 secondary schools, and a number of other services, to make sure all young people have the chance to benefit from volunteering in opportunities they are interested in. As well as gaining recognition and accreditation for their volunteering work, and increasing their confidence, skills and knowledge, our young people will meet new people and take part in new, enjoyable experiences.

Reaching Communities has given ERVAS additional capacity, and there will be a new buddy scheme to offer support to disabled young people and those with additional needs, including mental health issues.







Verge Nature Reserves

Road verges can be important refuges for wildflower grasslands that were once more abundant. As well as giving a home to flowers like orchids and cowslips, they also support butterflies and bees. They also provide a home for small mammals, which in turn can attract hunting barn owls.

Nearly 70 verges in the East Riding have been designated as Verge Nature Reserves. Almost 40 have also been designated as Local Wildlife Sites because of the number of wildflowers they support. In order to maintain their interest these verges need management. This includes cutting them, preferably in late summer after the flowers have set seed, and removing the cuttings. If verges are left unmanaged they can become dominated by brambles and be invaded by scrub from adjacent hedgerows.

LEADER funding for the Country Mile Project, which managed some of the verge nature reserves, ended in January 2012. East Riding of Yorkshire Council funded some management in 2012 but, with continued financial pressures on budgets, resources are no longer available for annual management of the reserves.

The sustainable development team is looking at different ways to secure the management of verge nature reserves. This may include funding from development schemes and working with farmers who wish to cut local verges for hay. They would also like to hear from any parish councils or community groups who would like to manage a local reserve. HMRC Employment Allowance

Almost every employer which is a charity, including community amateur sports clubs, and pays employer Class I NICs on their employee's earnings will be eligible to get Employment Allowance. This could reduce Class I National Insurance Contributions by up to £2,000 every year.

Beverley Folk Festival wins top prize

The best of the region's tourism industry was celebrated at the Remarkable East Yorkshire Tourism Awards on Thursday, I3 March at The Spa Bridlington. Prizes were awarded to over thirteen organisations from the region in the food, accommodation, attraction and event sections.

The Beverley Folk Festival was selected from a record number of entrants to be one of 71 finalists. It was up against tough competition with six other finalists in its category of Remarkable Tourism Event. It was picked as joint winner of the category with Hull's Freedom Festival - the first time judges could not choose a clear winner for the award.

The 2014 festival takes place on 20–22 June, with headliners such as Billy Bragg, and Chas and Dave on the bill. With First World War commemorative events taking place around the UK, author Michael Morpurgo will read from his book, War Horse, with musical accompaniment from acclaimed folk composer John Tams.
