Could you be a parish transport champion?

East Riding of Yorkshire Council has contacted town and parish councils to ask for their help with a county-wide assessment of transport needs. Parishes have been asked to nominate a parish transport champion who does not have to be a parish councillor. They could be anyone with an interest and enthusiasm for the role. This will help to develop the most appropriate ways of meeting these needs in the future.

A parish transport toolkit has been developed to help investigate local transport needs and gather evidence to build a case for potential solutions. This might be asking for changes to existing bus services or funding to pilot a range of other community-based transport.

The transport champion's role may vary from parish to parish but, in general, the key roles would be to:

- be the parish's key point of contact with East Riding of Yorkshire Council on local transport issues
- work with the council and other community members to carry out a local transport needs assessment using the Parish Transport Toolkit
- work with community members to organise local consultation about transport issues, either by household transport surveys, public meetings or discussions with local residents
- help publicise and promote the local transport services available in the parish.

Champions will be provided with the materials they need for assessing transport needs, such as printed survey forms.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council officers will provide technical advice and help, and analyse consultation results. They will also attend meetings to discuss consultation results and help champions and transport groups consider options for developing appropriate local transport solutions.

Is it easy to see a GP?

Healthwatch East Riding of Yorkshire, the independent watchdog for health and social care services in the East Riding, is carrying out research into local GP services in the region.

Healthwatch wants to know if it has got any easier for East Riding residents to get an appointment with their GP.

The survey is available until Thursday, 19 November at: surveymonkey.com/r/hwerygps

The report will be published at the end of November and will be a follow-up to a report published earlier in the year which looked at GP appointment systems.

This report will also look into the standards of GPs generally and examine if recommendations made in the earlier report have been followed.

The survey is being carried out online, and people can share their thoughts and concerns and highlight examples of good care they have received. The survey is anonymous.

Young people in the community

Are you concerned that there is a lack of things for young people to do? Would you like the chance to receive up to £5,000 to help create and develop youth provision in your community?

The youth and family support service wants to speak with town and parish councillors about an initiative to help create and develop new youth provision across the East Riding.

The funding can cover:

- start-up costs
- recruitment and selection of youth workers
- gathering the views and wishes of young people to shape the new provision
- access to training
- free equipment loan
- guidance on safeguarding and health and safety.

Limited funds are available and awards are made on a first-come, first-served basis.

Four successful projects are already running at Howden, Snaith and Cowick, Gilberdyke and Newport.

The money raised from the 5p bag charge in Tesco stores is being used to pay for projects to improve local green spaces. Projects will include building new pocket parks, sports facilities, woodland walks and community gardens.

Groundwork, which specialises in transforming communities and the local environment for the better, is administering the funding. It is seeking nominations for parks or open spaces that need a bit of love. These will be shortlisted in each Tesco region and voting will take place in local stores.

Community tree planting

The Conservation Volunteers has linked up with a national green energy supplier to offer a subsidised tree planting programme. They are looking for parish councils and community groups who would like to establish a project to plant trees and hedgerows within their parish.

The scheme is similar to the Woodland Trust's 'Big Tree Plant' scheme that The Conservation Volunteers were involved with over the past few years. A range of native tree species with spiral guard protection and canes can be provided, as well as a willing and able volunteer group to plant the trees for 75p per tree.

Past projects have helped establish small woodlands, plant parkland trees, provide wildlife-friendly hedgerows and improve green spaces with additional planting. Village SOS

This £1.4m Big Lottery-funded campaign wants to inspire rural communities across the UK to start social enterprises. It is led by Action with Communities in Rural England, supported locally by Humber and Wolds Rural Community Council.

Projects might include keeping services like shops or playgroups alive or starting up a new enterprise that could create income to benefit your local area. Potential projects and organisations that can be helped will serve local rural communities with a population of fewer than 10,000.

Village SOS has already been able to work with projects like looking at local broadband provision, community consultations, childcare schemes and multiple community buildings.

Neighbourhood Watch

Volunteers and community groups are being urged to think about setting up Neighbourhood Watch groups in order to create a safer environment.

The main purpose of a Neighbourhood Watch group is to prevent crime and create a more caring environment between neighbours. Groups are provided with window stickers and free street signs, and groups receive up-to-date crime information for their area.

Groups can vary in size from a few houses to a few streets. Some groups meet regularly and others communicate mainly by email. Once a group is set up, very little time is needed to run it.

Swanland heritage

It is said to have been raised from seed sent from America to Thomas Fillingham, a carter who worked in Swanland in the late 19th century.
